Message from the Provincial Director

We established <u>seven key policy</u> <u>points</u> to reduce poverty in BC.

Growth, transformation, & rebuilding

This has been another year of major growth, transformation, & rebuilding for the BC PRC. We have been building up our capacity: this year **our** <u>staff team</u> grew to 3.5 positions thanks to generous funding from <u>Vancity Credit Union</u>, & we have a permanent office space at 312 Main. The coalition continues to gather regularly & gain momentum, & we've had time to build out some of our strategic & systemic priorities.

In addition to the internal building out of our systems, infrastructure, & governance pieces, we have also turned our attention outward towards advocacy, campaign, & policy work. Most significantly, the <u>Provincial Poverty</u> <u>Reduction Strategy</u> underwent a formal review for the first time since it was established in 2018. We participated at every level of this process, from convening <u>CAN members</u> to give feedback informed by their lived expertise of the realities of poverty & its impacts & attending public town halls.Together with coalition members & policy experts, we also crafted a submission to the government of our <u>top seven</u> <u>recommendations</u> not just for poverty reduction, but poverty eradication in BC.

Going forward, these submission recommendations will form the backbone of our strategic advocacy goals. We aim to make these recommendations a reality, thus improving living conditions & realities for many individuals & families experiencing poverty.

This year saw wins, firsts, & the growth of partnerships at neighbourhood, municipal, & regional levels, including:

- á Black Leadership Program for folks of African descent with lived experiences of poverty and/or homelessness
- a CAN cohort in Kelowna
- a Housing Justice event in New Westminster
- new partnerships with housing researchers & advocates
- mobilizing residents of the Downtown Eastside to vote during the municipal elections
- anti-oppression workshops to strengthen the education & expertise of members
- 12 days of collaborative action to end immigration detention across Canada wins in 8 out of 10 provinces

We are living through trying times – climate change & extreme weather, a toxic drugs crisis, extreme affordability challenges, catastrophic housing costs, the rise of white supremacy & right-wing nationalism, anti-2SLGBTQIA+ ideologies & legislations, alongside attacks on reproductive justice, rising precarious work, & the erosion of public systems in favour or privatization. It's a lot to contend with. **These intersectional social issues require systemic interventions.** We need to mobilize effective, strong, & sustainable social movements to build sound policies reflective of lived experience & expertise.

Clearly, there is deep, hard work to do. We are so grateful for the funders, partners, members, CAN leaders, volunteers, board members, & our incredible staff team for moving the coalition forward. Together we are setting up good internal foundations to take up these challenges together. It has been another extraordinary year for the BC PRC, & I look forward to the upcoming year & seeing what we can do with the momentum we are building to create a poverty-free BC together!

New Society Governance Policies Updates - completed



CAN Kelowna: The BC PRC Successfully Completed <u>CAN Kelowna</u>'s Cohort - we were thrilled with the nine graduates who completed the program. Special thanks to our fantastic local guest speakers, our venue hosts at <u>metro community</u>, and the City of Kelowna staff who were able to support and join us! Our CAN graduates have also been participating in <u>Housing Needs Assessment + Healthy Housing Strategy | Get Involved Kelowna</u>. We look forward to see more great work from CAN Kelowna leaders!

Anti-Oppressive Workshops with HSABC, round 3: In 2023, the BC PRC, in partnership with the Homelessness Services Association of BC, launched a third round of our shared <u>anti-oppressive virtual free workshop series</u> to help empower members with knowledge, expertise, and tools in anti-oppressive theory and practice. Themes include areas like disability justice and crip kindness, Decolonization, Sex Work, and more. This iteration of the series is funded by the <u>Health Science Association's Equality and Social Action Fund</u>.

City of Vancouver Elections Project: We worked with the City of Vancouver, Exchange Inner City and other partners to employ CAN members and folks with living experiences of poverty to support equity-deserving people in <u>navigating barriers to voting in the</u> <u>Vancouver election</u>. This led to Lorna, a CAN leader, speaking on a panel webinar on <u>Getting Equity on the Political Agenda: Strategies</u>

at the Local Level, hosted by the Tamarack Institute.

Community consultant in an inquiry into hate during the pandemic: We participated as a community stakeholder in the BC Human Rights Commissioner's <u>Rise</u> of Hate during the Pandemic Inquiry. Rowan attended the in-person report launch and was in the report projects' video <u>calling for social condition to be</u> <u>added as a protected grounds to the</u> <u>Human Rights Code.</u>

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHT: BLACK LEADERSHIP LAB

We held our first-ever <u>Black CAN Leadership Program</u> in February and March 2023. With this program, we aim to **support the development of Black leadership** in the progressive advocacy sector. This series was for folks of African descent with lived & living experiences of poverty.

We are grateful to <u>Chanelle Tye</u> for co-facilitating with <u>Lama Mugabo</u>, our CAN Program Manager. Thanks to 312 Main for hosting the program space and the funders who made this program possible for the first time. Finally, thank you so much to the wonderful guest speakers who contributed so much with their expertise: <u>Cicely Blaine</u>, founder of Bakau Consulting; <u>Djaka Blais</u>, ED of the Hogan's Alley Society; <u>Dee Abdirahman</u> of the Liberation Collective; and one of our CAN Graduates, Margret Wanyoike.

The program launched during Black History Month and capped with a <u>Hogan's Alley</u> Walking Tour.

- **Presented** on panel: <u>Transforming Systems for Continued Poverty Reduction Success</u> that responded to the <u>2022 Report of the National Advisory Council on Poverty</u>.
- **Participated** in the <u>Home Energy Justice Forum</u> both as a panellist and speaker (Provincial Director) and as attendees (CAN members, staff).
- Acted as a Community Reviewer for West Coast Leaf's Gender Equity Report Card.
- Signed on to demand BC enact pay equity legislation.

The BC PRC was on the steering committee for the <u>Lived Experience Community 2030 | Canada Without</u> <u>Poverty</u> project and the report entitled "<u>Redefining the</u> <u>Consultation Proces; Recommendations for Community</u> <u>Co-Design Policymaking</u>".

The BC PRC contributed to this Churchill Fellow Scholar's report: <u>To empower people facing poverty</u> <u>through social and housing status rights-based models</u> <u>- Churchill Fellows Association of the ACT</u> by <u>Farzana</u> <u>Choudhury</u>.

CAN members are collaborating with <u>UBC researchers</u> on the issue of extreme weather impacts on renters and folks who are precariously housed.





The BC PRC and CAN Network participated in the "<u>Ethics of Engagement Project</u>" led by the City of New Westminster.

Following our work on <u>Public Transit and Equity-Deserving Groups</u>: Understanding Lived Experiences, the BC PRC also sat on the <u>Community and Equity</u> <u>Advisory Table (CEAT)</u> with Mobilizing Justice as a member.

With homelessness in Metro Vancouver at an all-time high, The BC PRC and CAN network have partnered with Douglas College on the <u>Changing the</u> <u>Conversation Project</u> on Housing Insecurity. The aim is to build a greater sense of solidarity among people who experience housing insecurity.

The BC PRC is a community group with the <u>Understanding Precarity in BC</u>, hosted by the Canadian Centre for Policy Alternatives.





The year marked significant growth of our CAN network. We have switched our governance model to reflect the importance of lived expertise in our work and to ensure a fair wage for CAN Leaders to support their participation.

community action network s

We've reduced barriers to civic engagement for CAN members by providing our leaders with media training and upcoming anti-racism and anti-oppression training to keep building skills. We also offer **hot meals, bus tickets, and childcare costs, and pay CAN Leaders a living wage** for their time in their advocacy for these kinds of engagements. We are so grateful to our funders and our leaders and partners who do this work.

This past year, PRC hosted two cohorts of the CAN training program, first in **Kelowna.** With the support of the Central Okanagan Foundation, we ran the Kelowna Cohort in the **fall of 2022**. In March 2023, CAN worked closely with the City of Kelowna and City Spaces, a consulting company that was hired to conduct a Housing Needs Assessment. We connected City Spaces with our CAN leaders, and they were able to conduct a thorough focus group with folks who are experiencing severe housing precarity.

In **February and March 2023**, with the support of the Reaching Home Foundation, the Langley Social Justice Committee, and 312 Main, we were also able to host our FIRST-ever **Black leadership program in Vancouver**!

This program included a field trip to our <u>Housing Justice event</u>, and a cohort Hogan's Alley Walking Tour and lunch. We appreciate Lama Mugabo's tireless work and advocacy in getting this program to launch during <u>Black</u> <u>History/Futures Month</u> and his commitment to organizing for racial and housing justice.

Our contribution to community building was recognized by the Planning Institute of BC (PIBC) with the highest award in urban planning: the <u>Gold Award for</u> <u>Excellence in City and Urban Planning</u>! The award was given to the City of New Westminster and PRC for the work CAN is doing in New Westminster.

CAN Leaders were invited to <u>showcase their community and policy work</u> at the HSABC annual conference on September 23–24, 2022! Their <u>multimedia</u> <u>project</u> explores a variety of policies that CAN Leaders have informed.

This year, PRC welcomed a CAN member on the <u>BC Poverty Reduction Advisory</u> <u>Committee</u> and many others on city advisory groups to impact local decisionmakers with their lived expertise. CAN work was featured in Tamarack Case Study: <u>Transforming Systems Through Lived Experience</u>.



Following <u>14 Days of Action</u> in 2022, which we undertook with a host of community partners, Vancouver City Council historically called on the province of British Columbia to <u>end</u> <u>immigration detention</u>. On July 21, 2022, <u>the BC Government committed</u> to ending their contract with the <u>Canadian Border Services Agency</u> (CBSA).

Eight out of ten provinces have now ended their contracts with CBSA as a result of this campaign. This is an incredible win for human rights in Canada! We will continue to hold the federal government to account to ensure this practice ends fully.

We support the **<u>Better Care for Seniors Campaign</u>** by BC Health Coalition.


